Complicity. Conflation. Can Faith Leaders Prevent VAW/G?

Extreme violence and disintegration of family structure over two wars led to higher rates and normalization of VAW/G, exacerbated by the intertwining of faith and culture through appropriated holy texts. Our baseline study showed that religious leaders were not trusted by GBV survivors for support and guidance.

Methodology

Engage Christian/Muslim faith leaders at all levels through participation in a learning process of self-identification, reflection, analysis and action; deconstructing concepts of gender and power; using revised interpretations of sacred texts: and shifting internalized attitudes and behaviors around VAW/G. Faith leaders engage congregations and communities through sermons, counseling, interfaith radio discussions, campaigns, participation in government working groups and improving service referrals.






Changing Perceptions


% of Faith leaders informed and confident to speak out against VAW/G increased by 14%



% of Communities responding to messages and changing their attitudes/behaviors increased by 83%




% of Communities that recognize and trust faith leaders to prevent or respond to violence increased by 54%




Leading Awareness Faith Leaders Including Youth

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
% of GBV survivors reporting cases to faith leaders and seeking support/guidance increased by 13%
