Sexual Violence Between Twa and Bantus

Location

- Twa People are located in Tanganyika Annual Conference in the following church districts:
- -Kabalo
- -Nyunzu
- -Kalemie
- -Manono
- All twa people are wanderers people, no fixed residence .

Twa

- No schools where twa live and are
- No health facility, they use herbs to treat each other
- No church
- Their main activity is hunting

- Upheaval of twa people , indegenous people
- In a village called "Monde", that means "world" whereby twa reside near kabalo village
- Sexual violence among pygmies themselves to women in nyunzu.
- Sexual violence of bantu to twa women people

- Chiefs of villages are bantus and in their leadership, they marry as many as they wish.
- Chiefs take by force women they want and that is why they wanted twa women who pleased them
- Chiefs of villages and army authority take also by force twa women.
- Twa husbands are in the weak position to claim their wives

- As a way to revenge out, twa men are armed with poisonous arrows that they use to fight against bantu men.
- Women are in the position of no say, they do not defend themselves. Their brain is washed by messages like, "twa women will be clean, will be well dressed and become wives of the chief and local authority".

- No access to education
- Twa cannot speak out to bantus
- Twa are slaves to bantus
- Bantus can marry a twa , no way round
- Twa are said to be dirty, they have no house to reside, no education, they are manpower to bantus.

- Adultury was like an evil necessary for twa
- It was an entry point to claim their women,
- It was an opportunity to tell openly how bantus treat them
- When a twa person works in bantu house as a maid, he is not treated decently.

Lifestyle

- They gather honey in the bush and they bring it in big villages for sale. They are tribes of gatherers
- The income generated serve to buy salt, clothes
- Some twa people who have moved in the big villages , they are maid and have some opportunity to send children to school but those children are discriminated in schools.

Life style



Amunazo said: "When I moved from Mukwaga because of conflict, I came to Settle in Nyunzu to give an opportunity To my son to study but he is stigmatised In nyunzu because of conflict'. I keep him at home. Facilitator asked: What change will Bring this training on peace and reconci Liation? Amunazo replied, '' I hope that local Authorities accept us as twa, we are Created as twa. We will not change and We are not wanted in the bantu village; If the church can advocate to bantus so That twa can be accepted.

Ways for solutions

- Catholic church has organised dialogue and conversation between twa and bantus in Kalemie and Nyunzu in 2015
- United Methodist Church has organised peace and reconciliation in november 2016
- Provincial government has organised peace talk in kalemie on peace and reconciliation january2017

Ways for solutions

- Dialogue, talk, conversation of faith organization and local authorities, like chiefs of the villages, militaries and security auhorities came together to tolerance and accpetance in tanganyika villages.
- Today, in nyunzu, Manono, Kalemie, twa people live in camps and they are accomodated, accepted and mingle with bantus.
- Some twa find jobs as maid in bantus homes

Ways of solution

- Daily income is used for food , clothes.
- Education is power to twa.
- During conflict, The local United methodist church sheltered twa people in nyunzu in the church. There is a local church now where a twa is the leader who read the bible that he explains other twa people as he was trained by united methodist pastor in nyunzu district

Way forward

- In order to create peace and value twa,
- United methodist women funded the training of women as peace builders in Nyunzu in november 2016.
- Twa men and women were invited and came to share stories of their lives, their vision and what they will do after peace training.
- The result of the training was , they began attending locan united methodist church


Way forward
