## Hub Goals (Launched Oct 2017)

### Evidence

Beginning the scoping study with the generous financial support of the Anglican Alliance. The Hub is working with Dr John Frame to produce this study.

### Timeline

- Literature Review: September 2018-November 2018
- Gap Map Analysis: November 2018
- Interviews and write-up: November 2018-January 2019
- Finalise and launch study: February 2019

1. Executive Summary
2. Introduction: the Hub's purpose and its strategic goals
3. Gap map analysis and introduction of themes explored in the remainder of the report
4. Presentation and discussion of the material (a synthesis of literature, interviews, and case studies)
5. Key audiences and recommended policy processes to influence, gleaned from the policy mapping process
6. Areas to be followed up by the JLI next (i.e. recommendations)

## Challenges:

- Due to financial limitations the scoping study was delayed and due to time capacity the first members meeting was delayed following the launch.
- To be consistent and meaningful in meetings and to ensure that there is growth of members particularly in the global south, the hub co-chairs will likely need some administration/ communications support following the scoping study to make contact with identified new members. They are investigating options for this including student, volunteer or paid support.

## Next Steps and 2019 Opportunities

- Launch of new Regional JLI AHT-MS Hubs located in key areas including Asia, and potentially in Americas and Africa
- Research workshops to address each of the three focuses of the scoping study in different locations (year 2)
- Bring together academics, policy makers and practitioners to: share research and best practice, identify gaps, develop case studies
- Media Engagement Strategy with 'Religion Media Centre', publication in appropriate academic journals and public engagement tailored to audiences

## 2018 Hub Work (Launched Fall 2017)

### ● Evidence: Scoping Study

Phase 1) Review of the evidence and literature on 2-3 topics with collation of practical examples from programming - completed

Phase 2) Primary data collection through case studies - completed

Phase 3) Semi-structured interviews with key informants to fill gaps (Oct - Dec 2018)

Scoping study to be completed before Christmas 2018

### ● Advocacy and Partnership

Synthesize key messages and create communications products (Jan-Feb 2019)

- Hub members help define the key messages

- Develop Outputs: summary, briefs, infographics, flyer/key social media messages

Disseminate findings (March-Nov 2019)

- Each hub member disseminate within their networks (email, social media, at events) .

- via faith based networks (WCC, WEA, Micah, etc.) and non-faith based networks

- JLI network, PaRD, Global Partnership to end violence against children (Arigatou is re-establishing contact), ISPCAN, others

- Avenues: email, social media (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram), WVI internal networks, Arigatou, through WCC, WEA, Anglican Communion, Jesuits, Press: UN Press Service, personal sharing

## Challenges

- Output specifically geared towards practitioners: how, who and with what funding?
- How do we involve/target faith actors?

## Next Steps & 2019 Opportunities

### ● Evidence

- identify key gaps and possible joint collaborations
- Joint collaboration and commission joint hub work to respond to research gaps and collaborate on research - Hub needs to identify funding
- Disseminating to local faith communities

### ● Communication and Advocacy

- Ensure religious leaders are engaged throughout process especially in regards to religious literacy
- Communicate: use evidence to inform and improve policy and practice
- Disseminate to appropriate audience in events lead up to 30th anniversary of the convention on the rights of children

## 2018 Hub Work (launched in 2014)

### Evidence

## Next Steps

- #1 Finalise the updated ToR of the hub by sharing with members for comment
- #2 Collaboration with PaRD Gender Equality Workstream: literature review to inform common evidence activities; webinar to discuss research gaps and research agenda
- #3 Develop a peer review process / guiding principles for GBV and faith research initiatives and offer service to hub members
- #4 Develop recommendations for academics & others working with the faith sector on GBV
  - Potential events/engagement at the SVRI on bridging gaps/building broader understanding of working with faith communities with academia
- #5 Promote inter + intrafaith dialogue through different mechanisms including online discussions and at key events and within hub membership
- #6 Develop/ share tools and guidelines on M&E of programmes
- #7 develop a database of researchers/programmes to match up appropriate researchers with programmes that need evaluation (promote south-south partnership)
- #8 Leverage existing resources and materials from hub membership
- #9 Encourage collaboration of events, webinars, resources and expertise of membership through active and regular engagement with membership.

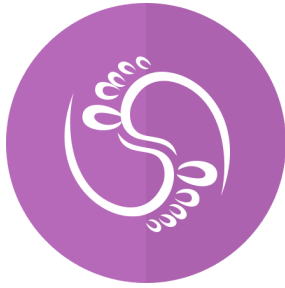

## Next Steps & 2019 Opportunities

- Evidence: Scoping Study part two on The Roles of Faith and Faith-Based Actors in Responding to the Needs of Forced Migrants across Different Phases and Places of Displacement to be completed. More research possible, eg other countries from UNHCR
- Communications: Provide targeted communications based on social network analysis and complete piloting training modules for local faith actors and humanitarian organizations. Publications from the current research
- Advocacy: Organisation of Policy seminars on policy implications of JLI Research – Funded by Henry Luce Foundation – Brussels, New York and Amman
